




### Day Four-46 Star Flag

By 1908, the United States of America had grown to encompass states from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Nearly all of the territory in between had also been recognized with statehood. When Oklahoma joined the Union, the U.S. Flag changed to include 46 stars, a design that would last for only four years and the administrations of two presidents, Theodore Roosevelt and William Taft. It was flying when the BSA was formed.



My country 'tis of thee, Sweet land of liberty... Although we know that Reverend Samuel Francis Smith wrote the words to "My Country 'Tis of Thee" (also known as "America"), the origin of the song's melody remains a mystery. And the history of its verses is even more complex. Before the music of "My Country 'Tis of Thee" made its way to the United States it was played in many countries. By the 1790's the melody

had become that of the Danish national anthem "A Song to be Sung by the Danish Subjects at the Fete of their King. Eventually it also became the national anthem of at least six other places. The first documented version of the melody printed in the American British colonies dates from 1761. The tune



of "God Save the King" was used . After the colonies became independent from England the words were further adapted for use in the United States. The words that eventually became a tradition, particularly among U.S. school children.

them by providing additional resources bevond even their expertise. The rocket boys are a great example of how people can have great effect on others through leadership principle application.



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### IFK Asks for a Raise in his Allowance

John Fitzgerald Francis Kennedy, President of the United States, was a Scout in Troop 2 in Bronxville, NY, from 1929 to 1931. Having just become a Boy Scout and acutely aware that his weekly allowance wouldn't cover the cost of such a lifestyle, 10-year old John approached his father and asked for a raise of 30¢. Keen to teach the future President a quick business lesson, Kennedy Sr. immediately told him that unless his plea was put in writing, it wouldn't be heard.

The following letter soon arrived at his desk.



Dedicated to my Mr. J. P. Kennedy

Before I would spend 20¢ of ¢.40 allowance and In five minutes I would have empty pockets and nothing to gain and 20¢ to lose. When I a a scout I have to buy canteens, haversacks, blankets, searchlidgs, poncho things that will last for years and and I can always use it while I can't use a cholcalote marshmellow Sunday with vanilla ice cream and so I put in my plea for a raise of thirty cents for me to buy scout things and pay my own way more around.

#### THROUGH NORMAN'S EYES

Today's featured Rockwell Print, "A Scout is Helpful," is a reminder of the many hours of selfless service and heroism that we witness all around us each day. The Boy Scout Handbook states that "A Scout is helpful. A Scout cares about other people. He helps others without expecting payment of reward. He fulfills his duties to his family by helping at home" With many of the storms, calamites, and difficult economic times the need for being "helpful" is more critical than ever. Recently an event occurred that illustrated this most heartfelt of attributes. The first was the rescue of a trapped motorcyclist under a burning car. Multiple citizens raced to the aid of the motorists without being asked or summoned over. Their spontaneous action without regard to their own safety to lift the car and pull the man to safety saved his life. The men who were interviewed later stated

that they did not "consider themselves heroes," just grateful to have been in the right place at the right time.

There is a touching story during the move west in the 1850's of a rescue of stranded travelers on the foothills of the Rocky Mountains. As many of the pioneers were too weakened by their ordeal, several of the rescuers carried them across the freezing river. Many of these

young men later died of their exposure. Their sacrifice is similarly reflected in this painting.

There are many stories like this in the annals of history. May we strive to instill into our Scouts and into ourselves the desire to put our fears and self interest aside to help those in need of help.
